## Questions

What is known about the original owner?

Did an architect design the house? If so, who was it and what is known about him/her? Who else has owned or lived in the house over the years and what is known about them? What alterations (structural or cosmetic) have been made to the house since it was built?



In the 1890s John M. E. Morrill acquired a large tract of land, once part of the Walter Baker estate. He commissioned a subdivision plan in 1897 and proceeded to sell off lots to developers and home builders.

On September 13, 1889, Morrill sold the parcel that became 51 Waldeck Street to Susan F. Stanley with restrictions: "Subject to the following restrictions which are to be placed upon all the lots facing on said Waldeck Street for a term of ten years from June 14, 1897. No house built to accommodate one family shall cost less than thirty five hundred (\$3,500); No apartment house, no house to accommodate more than two families are to be built, and two family houses shall cost not less than forty five hundred dollars

(\$4,500). No stores, factories, livery stables or workshops shall be built; all houses shall be set back not less than twenty feet (20 ft.) from street line and all other buildings shall set back not less than forty (40) feet from said street line, which the lot faces; and corner lots shall not have the houses less than twenty feet from the side street; No houses are to be built with flat roof."

#### Also

"Subject to a mortgage to W. Sidney Baker and Florence M. Bridgman ... which mortgage can be released on payment of twenty cents per foot."

In May, 1900, Stanley sold to Levi Chadbourne, who also built the new two-family home in 1900, to a design of architect Cornelius A. Russell. The house was to be 28 feet wide and 48 feet deep, with a probable cost above land of \$4,500.

Russell was a well-known regional architect, especially of apartment blocks. When he first came to Boston, he was a carpenter, but by 1890 he had established himself as an architect with offices in Roxbury. In 1892 he designed the Goldsmith Block at 746-750 Shawmut Avenue. He designed Walton and Roslin Halls at 702-746 Washington Street, Dorchester, in 1897. He designed the Russell Building in Egleston Square, a mixed-use building for thirteen families and two stores. The building was completed in December, 1897, for \$40,000.

Chadbourne sold the property with the new home to Joseph Massell in April of 1901. In December of 1902 Massell sold the property to Morris Solomont, then Solomont sold the property to Pauline Massell in January, 1903. The Massell family lived in the house until the 1930s. Joseph and Pauline had three children listed in the census for 1910. The 1920 census listed four children. Joseph and Pauline were born in Russia, and the 1920 census indicates that their tenants were also from Russia. Joseph was a dentist.

In the 1930s, the number of people living in the house increased, probably a result of the Depression. It appears that adult children delayed moving out on their own. Some of the residents are listed below in the Sources section, where entries are given from the Boston Resident lists of the first half of the 1930s. The lists include residents 20 years of age or older on April 1st of the year.

James A. Weeks, a painter, bought the house by 1933, as shown in the 1933 atlas. The Weeks family was living in the property by 1930. The 1935 Boston Resident list of persons 20 years of age or older on April 1st of that year has an entry for 51 Waldeck:

There do not seem to have been major structural changes. The building permits available at Inspectional Services reveal that a garage was built in April, 1926. On February 15, 1934, as a result of an inspection due to a fire, the building inspector recommended repair of the chimney, where bricks were loose and repair of the mortar gone near the roof beams. On February 16, 1934, there was an application for a permit to replace all burned timbers on the roof; shingle it with asphalt shingles and make the rear stairway from the attic satisfactory to the building department

Russell designed a remodeling of 334 Commonwealth Avenue in 1909

Cornelius A. Russell was born on October 20, 1855, in Nova Scotia.

He married on July 10, 1894, in Chicago, to Alice Burgoyne (b. 1861-1863 in OH), daughter of Erastus McNeill Burgoyne and his wife, Sarah Cummins.

Cornelius Russell died on September 15, 1927, in Boston, killed in an automobile accident.

#### Career

Cornelius Russell came to the United States in the early 1870s and received his citizernship in October of 1887.

When he first came to Boston, he was a carpenter. He may have worked as a pianomaker in the early 1880s, but was again a carpenter by 1885, in partnership with Alexander B. Pinkham. He continued as a carpenter in 1889, but by 1890 had established himself as an architect with offices in Roxbury.

By the mid 1890s, Fred Newton Russell, probably his nephew, had joined his office as a draftsman. In about 1903, they formed the firm of C. A. and F. N. Russell, architects and real estate develoers. They remained partners until about 1918. Most of their work appears to have been residential buildings in the Roxbury area, where they offices were located. By 1919, he was a sole practitioner, working out of his home in Jamaica Plain.

The building at 41 Ruggles Street, 746-750 Shawmut Avenue was built in 1892 by Samuel Goldsmith to a design by Cornelius Russell, a regionally notable designer of apartment blocks.

Walton and Roslin Halls is a mixed-used commercial and residential building that was built in two parts. They are located at the corner of Washington and Walton Streets in the Dorchester neighborhood of Boston, Massachusetts, and extend south along Washington Street. The first of the two buildings, that at 3-5 Walton Street and 702-708 Washington, is a three-story brick and wood frame structure built in 1897 to a design by Cornelius A. Russell; the southern portion was completed a year later. The building housed a commercial space on the ground floor, and residential units above



The Littlefields hired the notable architect Cornelius Russell to design the handsome, corner apartment house at 3118-3122 Washington Street, replacing a Cox building which had one of the first ground-floor stores. The Russell building was completed in December 1897 for \$40,000. It also had a doorway at 87 School Street. It was built for thirteen families and two stores.




1898 atlas
